Esto to increase water utility rates starting next year

In order to maintain financial stability and ensure continued service quality, the Town of Esto will increase water utility rates effective January 1,

The new base rate inside town limits will be \$29.91 up to 2,000 gallons. After that limit, the rate per 1,000 gallons will be \$7.03 up to 5,000 gallons; \$7.20 upto8,000 gallons; \$7.75 up to 12,000 gallons; and \$8.15 for over 12,001 gallons.

The rates for outside town limits will be a \$33.21 base rate up to 2,000 gallons and a per-1,000 gallon rate of \$7.80 up to 5,000 gallons; \$8.19 up to 8,000

News. Advertiser to return to separate publications

Washington County News and Holmes County Advertiser will be restored to separate publications as of November 1, parent company Kent Smith Group announced this week. While the News and Advertiser have their own websites. the two community newspapers were combined into one print product in late 2022 by the former parent company.

"When my partner, Adam Smith, and I acquired the newspapers, we promised the readers we would work to ensure Holmes and Washington counties would once again have their own community paper," said Publisher Carol Kent. "While these communities are similar, they

Bonifay mayor, residents continue to argue over financial transparency

Tensions have continued to publicly flare between Bonifay Mayor Larry Cook and town residents.

Larry Cook and resident Richard Willsey argued during a City Council meeting on Monday, Oct. 23, over a public records request filed regarding a pancake fundraiser breakfast for the Bonifay Fire-Rescue, a volunteer organization.

"Why would you want to know what the fire department pancake fundraiser brought in?" Larry Cook said. "What are you getting at? I have 20 guys that wake up at four in the morning and they cook pancakes and they work their butts off and you want to know how much money they made. What is wrong with you?"

"The people would like to know where the money has been applied to for the budget," Willsey said. "Iamin no way opposed to the fire department.... Every dollar raised in contributions is required to be documented as received and where it is allocated to be spent."

"Why is it that the fundraiser for the Bonifay fire department isn't accounted for by the city? Is there a secret bank account for the fire department to use for whatever they choose?" Willsey continued. "Where is the accountability for this and who is overseeing this? Sounds like another case of the good old boys just taking care of the good old boys.

Fire Chief Travis Cook said he has been the treasurer for the fire department's account since 2005, where all fundraiser money goes to and expenses come out of.

"It is also audited. It is a city account,"Travis Cook said. "We've never had any accounting practice issues or violations."

Travis Cook said he was notified of the public records request and responded the same day he received it.

"Like I said in previous meetings, if you need any fire department information, there's no need to go to a public records request. I can get you that information," Travis Cook said. "This was our largest fundraiser for the year. This was year 19, so we expect year 20 to be bigger. We were very happy with the turnout of everybody that showed up. The total received on that Saturday was \$8576.02."

Willsey further said he filed public records requests regarding the city's pub-

When animal lovers need to find a home for a dog or cat or your dog has puppies you can't care for, they might look for a local rescue.

Lucky Puppy in Bonifay has been one of many rescues taking in animals but that could all change since the rescue is in need of financial assistance.

The nonprofit rescue opened their doors in Bonifay 16 years ago, offering the public an alternative to "kill shelters" in the area, but founder and president Terri Mattson says she can no longer take in more animals.

With 200 animals currently on the farm and no financial support to keep going, their doors might close forever.

Food that was normally donated now falls on the shoulders of the shelter. That does not include veterinarian bills, medications, and basic items like power, gas, and insurance.







3-ingredient Pumpkin "Brownies"

Ingredients:

15-ounce can pumpkin (not pumpkin pie filling)

1 box brownie mix

1 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line a 9x9-inch baking ban with aluminum foil, leaving some extra on each end for easy removal from the pan when brownies have cooled. Spray the foil with
- 2. In a medium mixing bowl, combine the pumpkin and the spice, whisking to combine. Add the brownie mix, and then fold in with a

Pumpkin Blondies

Ingredients:

2 cups all-purpose flour

11/2 teaspoons of cinnamon

1/4 teaspoon fresh nutmeg

1 teaspoon baking soda 3/4 teaspoon salt

2 sticks unsalted butter, room temperature

3/4 cup sugar

3/4 cup brown sugar

1 large egg

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

1 cup canned pumpkin puree

1 cup white chocolate chips

Method:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line bottom and sides of a 9-by-13inch baking pan with foil, leaving an overhang on all sides. Spray
- 2. In a medium bowl, whisk together flour, cinnamon, nutmeg, baking soda, and salt.

With an electric mixer, cream butter and both sugars until smooth. Beat in the egg and vanilla until well blended. Add the pumpkin puree. Reduce speed to low, and mix in the flour mixture until just combined. Don't overmix. Stir in the white and cinnamon chips by hand.

- 3. Spread batter evenly into the prepared pan. Bake for about 35-40 minutes. The sides will pull away from the pan and brown a bit. Do the toothpick test, if it comes out clean. They are done. Cool completely in pan. Lift the blondies from the pan, using the foil. from pan. Peel off the foil and cut into squares.
- 4. If you like, you can drizzle with melted white chocolate or cream cheese icing, too. 100% delicious!

Steph's Cranberry-Pumpkin Bread

Ingredients:

1 cup dried cranberries

1/3 cup water

1/2 cup canola oil

2 large eggs

3/4 cup canned pumpkin puree

2 cups plain flour

3/4 cup white sugar

1 teaspoon baking soda

1/2 teaspoon salt

Method:

- 1. Plump the berries: Place the 1/3 cup water in a saucepan with the cup of dried cranberries. Bring to a simmer, stir, and remove from heat.
- 2. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.
- 3. In a medium mixing bowl, whisk together the dry ingredients.
- 4. In another bowl, lightly beat eggs. Add pumpkin and oil, and whisk until combined.
- 5. Add wet mixture to dry, and gently stir until just combined (no remaining visible clumps of flour)
- 6. Fold in berries, including the juice that they've created. Combine gently with spatula until they are evenly distributed in the batter.
- 7. Pour batter into a loaf pan that you've sprayed with Pam or Baker's Joy, or greased and floured.
- 8. Bake until a toothpick inserted in center of loaf comes out clean. For a large loaf, expect it to take about an hour. If dividing into two smaller loaf pans, bake for about 35 minutes. (I do this to
